Upcoming Event - "Caravan" for Feast Debbie Berard

To break the mid-winter blahs, our February function will be a caravan to Capt. John's Crab House in Cobb Island, Maryland on Saturday, February 11 for a feast. OYCers and guests will gather at the Occoquan Harbour Marina parking lot for a 10:00 a.m. departure. Travel time is approximately an hour and a half.

For those of you who have not been to Capt. John's, it's a very nice crab house on Neale Sound off of the Wicomico River. They have a varied menu with seafood being the speciality of the house. Dinners range from \$6.95 to \$16.95. They always have an all-you-can-eat special. During the winter, it is usually steamed oysters and steamed shrimp. In the summer months it's crabs - of course, what else?

My last phone call confirmed the all-you-can-eat special as steamed oysters and shrimp for \$15.95. They don't think they will have crabs, but there is always a chance they will get them in; although, he said availability right now is poor.

As mentioned earlier, our plan is to meet at OHM at 10:00a.m. to "caravan it" to Cobb Island. If you've never been to Capt. John's or Cobb Island, you really should try to join us. It's a great restaurant and the island is very quaint. Please call Marilyn at 490-4857 before February 4, so we can give the restaurant an expected head count. If this doesn't get you excited for boating season to hurry and get here, nothing will.

The first 1989 OYC function was held Saturday, January 14 at the Harbour Inn to review the tentative schedule. There were 43 members/guests in attendance (had I known it would be so well attended, I would have had the room arranged to accommodate seating for everyone - sorry for any inconvenience). We were hoping for more people to volunteer for the various vacant positions and for the various

functions. However, we do understand that the year is young and the boating season is still only just around the corner. I have faith that once the boating season gets into full gear things will fall into place and everything will run smoothly. The 1989 schedule appears elsewhere in the Daymarker and is on its own page so you can post it somewhere convenient.

This is a volunteer Club, and we currently have over 180 "volunteers". So, with hopes of filling some of the vacant positions, I list them for you to review so you can then call me and tell me which one you are willing to fill.

For the ADVISORY BOARD we need a *Rear Commodore for Power*. This position will be responsible for overseeing all of the boating functions with the various Cruise Coordinators and their committees working with the RC-P; we need a *Training Officer* who will coordinate any training functions that are held; and, we need a *Facilities/Property Officer* who will be responsible for maintaining an inventory of the Club's property (some of which is in the Club Shed and some of which is temporarily stored over the Marina Store).

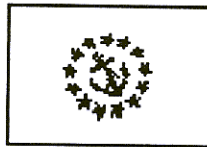
For the AD HOC COMMITTEE positions, we need an *Historian*, who will be the custodian of the Club's photo albums and who will be responsible for receiving photos of Club activities and displaying them at Club functions; we need a *Social Officer (or Officers)* to be responsible for overseeing the social activities and working with the various function coordinators; a *Junior Coordinator (or Coordinators)* - this position could be quite rewarding for the leader(s) as well as our Junior Members (we currently have 20 Junior Members [which equates to at least 20 adults] and it would be nice to have a Junior Program); a *Nominating Committee Leader*, who will work with the Committee to come up with a slate of candidates for the 1990 Executive Board; and, a *Quartermaster* to handle the orders for clothing. The positions already filled are Membership (John Piper), Delegate to PRYCA/CBYCA (Bob LaSerte), and Delegate to UPRC (Pat Utter).

I realize "volunteering" generally is not the nature of the human, but the Daymarker is the only medium for notifying all members of these needs. Gee, do you suppose I can just sit back and wait for the phone to ring ?

We have just received notice from Chesapeake Bay Magazine that the 1989 edition of *Guide to Cruising the Chesapeake Bay* is now available to us at a special discount price of \$16.95 when purchased in lots of 16 or more. That equates to a savings of \$6.00 of the normal \$22.95 cover price. If any of you are interested, please call me at 490-4857 and when we reach 16 orders, I'll send in the form.

I have also just received word from BOAT/U.S. that our request for grant funds for our fire extinguisher exercise was not selected. Although we are disappointed, we will still be conducting the exercise in April. Each of us will have to pay \$7.05 per extinguisher to have them recharged. It is a small price to pay for the hands-on experience of using a fire extinguisher in a controlled situation, with the hope of never having to use one in a real situation.

The OYC once again made news in the Chesapeake Bay Magazine - as I mentioned last month, they get a complimentary copy of the Daymarker, and they peruse it for information for their publication. Well, in the February issue, on page 86, Bay apparently felt the VHF net concept was worth reporting. As the boating season gets rolling, there will be additional information on the concept, and we'll give it a try.



Exec. Rear Commodore Comments

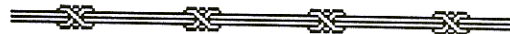

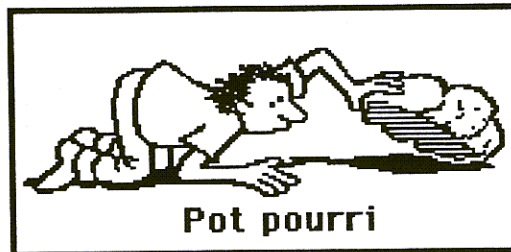

First Mate's Course

I am offering a "First Mate's Course" for anyone who wishes to take it. The course is abbreviated to help current or future First Mates to feel a bit more comfortable with some of the basics of boating. Currently its on a one-on-one basis; however, if you have a friend or two with whom you would feel comfortable working/learning, that's okay too. The course is designed with a suggested outline; however, it is also geared to any particular question(s) or problem(s) you may have. Some of the topics included are Basic Line Handling, Chart Reading, Duties of a First Mate, Hands on Radio Usage, and, Tips on Anchoring. The length of the course is basically up to you - the first session of the current course lasted approximately four hours and there is at least one more session scheduled, which could also last another four hours. It's at your speed and at your level of grasp. This "First Mate's Course" is in no way intended to replace the recommended Coast Guard course, but a "Certificate of Completion" will be awarded. Proposed By-Law Changes

The Board has reviewed the By-Laws as they stand now and propose some minor, but important changes.

Paragraph 6 of Article IV—GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS (page 7) allows for changes in the By-Laws ONLY at "the Annual General Membership Meeting", which is the October meeting. Even though we have amended the By-Laws in a March meeting in the past, there is no real provision for changes at any other time other than the October Meeting. Therefore, it is proposed that the sentence "If any member desires to have a vote on a change of these By-Laws, such change proposed must be published to regular members two weeks in advance of the Annual General Membership Meeting." be changed to read "If any member desires to have a vote on a change of these By-Laws, such change proposed must be published to regular members two weeks in advance of a General Membership Meeting." And, therefore, it is further proposed that if that sentence change is approved, that that sentence be moved to be the last sentence of Paragraph 6 of Article IV.

If the above is approved, then we can go forward with the following proposed changes:

Since any new Board is tasked with the scheduling of events for the next calendar year, it is felt that that new Board should finish out all scheduled events of the calendar year it has planned. Therefore, it is proposed to add the following sentence at the end of Paragraph 2 of Article IV—EXECUTIVE BOARD (page 5): The Executive Board shall be responsible for the scheduling of events for the upcoming calendar year and be responsible for conducting those events through that calendar year.

In Paragraph 3 of Article IV—STANDING COMMITTEES (page 5), the word *shall* allows for no flexibility to not appoint the Standing Committees. When the Club was founded, it was about half sail and half power and we needed the Race/Sail/Power Committees. (If you have read this far and are the first OYCer to call 490-4857, you will receive a free OYC burgee.) Now that we are primarily power boats, it is felt that we should not have to appoint these Committees since they really have no function. However, it is also felt that should the ratio change in the future and these Committees are needed, the flexibility to or not to appoint should be there. Therefore, it is proposed to change the word *shall* to *may* - and thus the sentence should be changed to read: The Executive Board may appoint persons to the following Standing Committees.

Paragraph 7 of Article IV—PROCEDURAL RULES, subparagraph (b) VOTING (page 7) - It is felt that in addition to voting by proxy, absentee ballot should also be allowed. Although the By-Laws don't prohibit absentee ballot, it is felt that the addition is worthy of consideration. Therefore it is proposed that the sentence "Voting by proxy shall be permitted at all meetings." be changed to read "Voting by proxy or absentee ballot shall be permitted at all meetings."

Since we are not prohibited from using an absentee ballot, all Regular Members will find not only a proxy form but also

an absentee ballot included with this issue of the *Daymarker*. Therefore, if you are unable to attend the March General Membership Meeting, please exercise your voting privilege by filling out the proxy by inserting the name of the person to whom you are giving your proxy, print your name, sign and date the proxy and send it to the OYC P.O. Box; or, vote on the absentee ballot, print your name, sign the ballot and send it to the OYC P.O. Box. Each Regular Member is entitled to one vote.

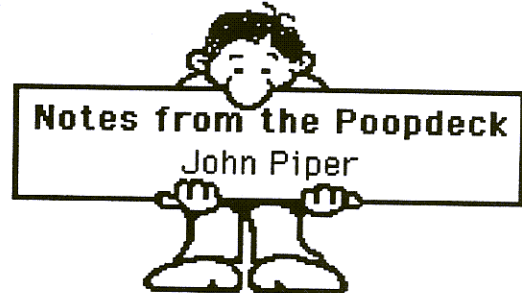

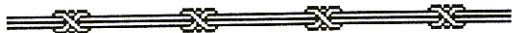
When you tell someone that you spent the weekend on the boat and did absolutely nothing. You just sat and watched the water or you read. You get the "look".

New Coast Guard Pilot Program

The following is filched from the February 1989 issue of Soundings, the entire article written by Sam Rosensohn entitled "US to target 10 states for new BWI law":

"The Coast Guard has targeted 10 states for a pilot program this summer to enforce a new federal boating-while-intoxicated (BWI) law fraught with pitfalls.

"Patrol boats equipped with breath-analysis meters may stop drunk boaters in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Virginia, North Carolina, Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania and New Jersey. The boats will carry the meters as standard equipment and not go out on specific drunk-boating patrols, a spokesman said.

"The Coast Guard, worried about acceptance of a new stop-boater policy after one year of the controversial, anti-drug zero tolerance, is planning a big public relations campaign to explain the \$200,000 BWI program.

" 'We don't want another public relations fiasco,' said Cmdr. George Flanigan, chief of the general law enforcement branch in Washington, D.C.

"This time the stakes are different for the boater. Under zero tolerance, a suspect's boat could be seized. Under the

new drunk-boating law, a boater could be fined up to \$1,000 for a civil offense, or sent to prison and fined up to \$5,000 for a criminal case.

"But how the Coast Guard and the states arrest and prosecute a drunk boat operator has not been worked out. The Coast Guard has not even decided what to do with the operator, the boat and passengers once an arrest is made.

"The problems have been so thorny that an attempt to launch the program last summer in Long Beach, Calif., and Portsmouth, Va., never came off.

"These are some of the dilemmas the Coast Guard expects to confront this summer when it begins to enforce the drunken boater law:

• How does the Coast Guard sell this to the public?

"Flanigan said the Coast Guard's public relations campaign detailing the new program is planned so that boaters would not be surprised by the new patrol duties.

" 'We've asked our public affairs people to come out with a complete explanation from top to bottom,' Flanigan said. Announcements will be made on television and radio and in newspapers and magazines.

"Flanigan said the program's success depends in part upon how well it's accepted by the public. If the program works, Flanigan said the Coast Guard plans to expand it nationwide in 1990.

• What to do with the intoxicated boater after the arrest?

" 'If mom and pop are drunk and the kids are in the back of the boat, what do we do?' said Flanigan. 'Do we just tow the boat? Where do we take them? Do we set them loose on the dock; let them hop in a car and wreck havoc on the highways?

" 'Do we keep them long enough so they're sober? We don't want the kids wandering around the docks and falling off the side while we deal with their parents. And, of course, working with drunks is not going to be fun,' Flanigan said.

• Who will prosecute the arrested boater?

"The Coast Guard does not want to prosecute drunken boaters. It would like to make arrests and turn the cases over to local police and courts for prosecution. But that might not always happen.

"In Virginia, for instance, state law mandates that a state arresting officer observe the intoxicated boater. The state cannot accept the Coast Guard's word for it.

• What if a state or federal court will not take the case?

"A court may not accept the Coast Guard's test results. Or a state may not handle the case because of conflicting local laws. That leaves the federal prosecutor.

" 'The U.S. Attorney doesn't want to spend his time handling drunken boater cases,' Flanigan said. 'Our guess is that if the state won't handle it, and the U.S. Attorney doesn't want it, then we would have our own administrative hearing.'

New Bridge over Occoquan

The Coast Guard's Local Notice to Mariners has announced that there will be a bridge constructed over the Occoquan River at mile 2.9, Woodbridge, VA. According to Public Notice 5-684 issued December 23, 1988 there are plans to construct "dual bridges (northbound/southbound lanes) parallel to the existing fixed I95 highway dual-lane bridge." There is no timeframe given; however, when construction does begin, it will impact on boaters up-river from the I-95 bridge. Anyone wishing to read the Public Notice may either stop by the DUNMOEN, or write to U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Building, 431 Crawford Street, Portsmouth, VA 23705-5004.

VHF - Channel 16

The following is filched from the October issue of Motor-boating & Sailing - Gordon West's Electronics Q&A article because his answer is of interest to OYCers:

"Q: Last weekend, someone broadcast on Channel 16 that it was an 'official FCC station,' and then indicated they were issuing citations to everyone misusing the channel. Please explain how this works.

"A: I seriously doubt the FCC actually made that announcement. They rarely transmit on the air to rule violators. However, there is no question that misuse of Channel 16 jeopardizes legitimate distress and safety calls. The U.S. Coast Guard **now tape-records all Channel 16 transmissions**, and they routinely turn their tapes over to the local FCC office. The FCC may then prepare official notices of violation. An unanswered notice could lead to fines and forfeiture." (Bold highlight added by Daymarker Editor.)
